At any time, you can set the rule that no word may be used more than once on each grid.

FIND THE WORDS

Children can complete each grid independently, or use dictionaries or online resources. The **ONLY** rule is that, if challenged, the **DEFINITION** of a word used must be explained.

BAN A LETTER!

Introduce your class to lipograms! A lipogram is a writing constraint in which the writer omits a certain letter of the alphabet. You can add an extra tier of challenge by “banning” certain letters for each grid. For example, if you prevent children from using the letter ‘e’ (the most-used letter in the English language), the puzzle becomes even more difficult to complete.

You can choose whichever letter to ban – banning vowels make the puzzles even more challenging than banning consonants. (Children should still be able to define any words they have used.)

COUNT THE SCORES

Children could be given the scoring system we used when producing the best-selling AnyWord Xword app – so that letters which appear less frequently in the English language “score” more points for each completed grid. Children can then work out their own scores, or other pupils’ scores working individually or in small teams: a great way to integrate mental maths skills within a literacy lesson. Again, children will need to define any words they have used.

We have included a scoring system at the back of this pack. You could, of course, create your own.

CROSS CURRICULAR LINKS

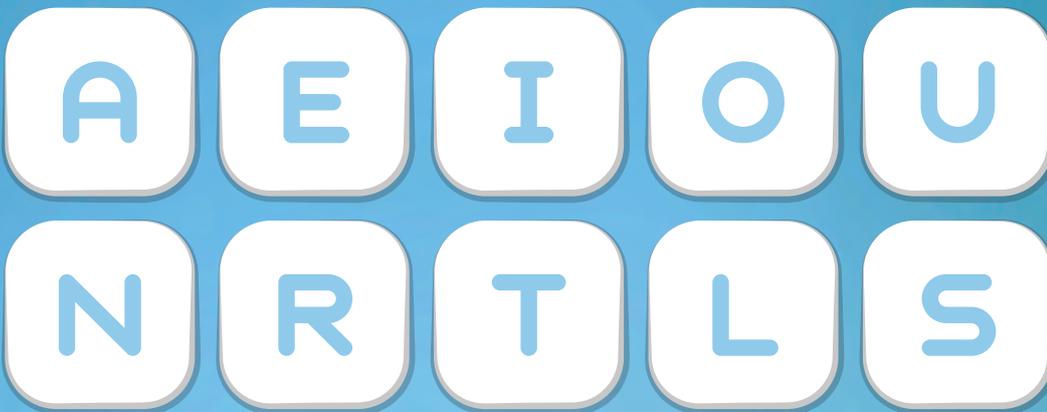
Each grid has a “topic” space so that, if you wish, you could direct children to use vocabulary linked to an area of study from other aspects of the curriculum. For example, if they are learning about World War 2, the words they use to complete their grids must be linked to that topic. Again, they should be able to explain the meaning of each word.

CHANGE THE LANGUAGE

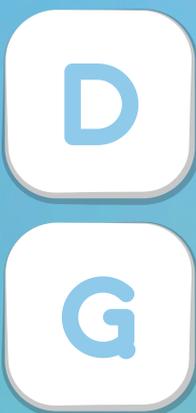
Each grid can be completed in any language, so they could be incorporated into an MFL classroom setting.

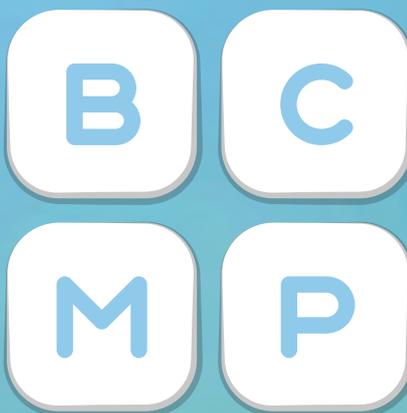

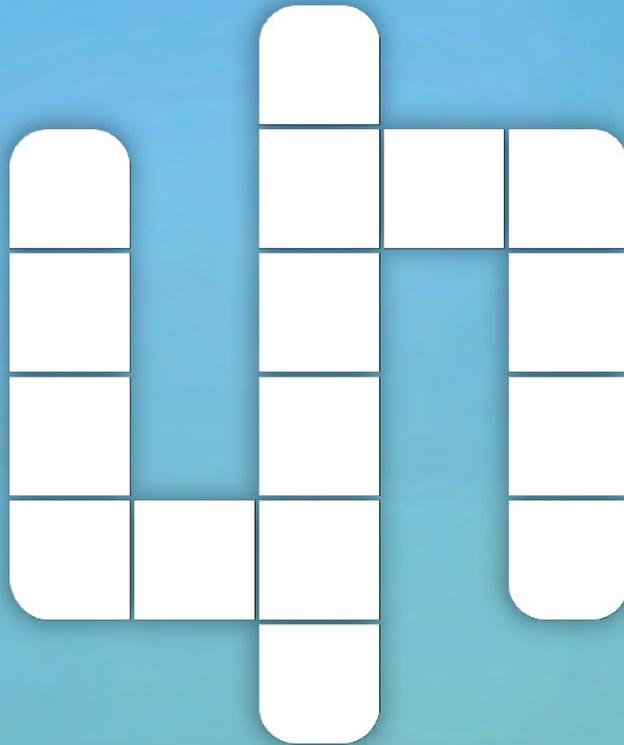
